

Ending The HIV (HCV/STI) Epidemic

- This IO-year initiative beginning FY
 2020 seeks to achieve the goal of
 reducing new HIV infections in the
 United States to less than 3,000 per
 year by 2030 (Diagnose, Treat, Prevent, and
 Respond).
- In San Francisco, we incorporated the goals of goals of elimination of hepatitis C (HCV) and reducing sexually transmitted infections (STIs), including overdose prevention and COVID-19 services.






The Syndemic Approach: Overlapping Epidemics of HIV, HCV, and STIs

■ "The concentration and harmful interaction of two or more disease or other health conditions in a population, especially as a consequence of social inequity and the unjust exercise of power."

-M. Singer, Introduction to Syndemics (SOCIAL SCIENCE DEFINITION)

Considers the connection among illness and what influences them (together and individually) to develop prevention and care activities, and aligns with other avenues of social change to assure improved health outcome and community well-being



Prevention dollars (CDC)


- CDC PS-20-2010: "Integrated HIV Program for Health Departments to Support Ending the HIV Epidemic in the United States"
- 5 years starting March 1, 2020
- \$2.7 million per year (+) for 5 years
- Comp A: \$2,290,288 Community Health Equity & Promotion (CHEP), DPH
- Comp C: \$450,000
 - Project Expand and Elevate (ExEl) will enhance and expand integration of STI and HIV prevention care services at San Francisco City Clinic (SFCC)

Overall Scope: HIV, HCV, and STIs

24 objectives focusing on:

- Increased integration of HCV and STI services in HIV Prevention and Care Efforts
- Enhanced peer-navigation services, including integrated testing sites, diagnoses, linkages to treatment, care, and wrap-around services, care, and sustaining efforts
- Re/Integration into care for PLWH (both never been or who have fallen out of care)
- Reduce/eliminate disparities in HIV health outcomes among populations with highest disparities
- Routinized, more frequent opt-out screenings
- Enhanced supportive services for PLWH Mental health, housing, substance use treatment, overdose prevention strategies, job training
- Increase access to PrEP and PrEP 211
- Increased use of technology and communication efforts
- Development of STI Task Force
- Data acquisition and dissemination
- Respond more effectively to cluster-based and sub-group specific issues

- SFGH Ward 86 Prevention Hub establish a clinical HIV Prevention Program at ZSFG; expand testing efforts and PrEP access

- TakeMeHome HIV/STI Self-Testing Program Free HIV/STI home testing program launched in February 2021 by SFDPH



- Point of connection between HCPC, GTZ, EHCSF, STI Task Force, CBOs, CAPs, and other community efforts
- Serve as liaisons to represent the questions, concerns, or perspectives of organizations/networks/communities they represent

ETE Meetings

Monthly ETE SC meetings: 3rd Mondays 3-4pm

- 10-15 members total, who are committed to attending every meeting
- Work to support and guide the outcomes the ETE activities, including:
 - a) understand activities towards meeting ETE workplan citywide
 - b) discussing gaps and challenges among service provision to priority populations
 - c) identifying innovative programming that meets the needs of priority population
 - d) identifying points of intersection among syndemic to enhance prevention and care efforts
